Welcome to Bendeela Recreation Area, home to many native animals. As visitors to Bendeela we need to take care of the Bare-nosed wombats.

#### **Wombat Facts**

- Wombats are large burrowing marsupials found only in Australia.
- The 'Bare-nosed' wombats of Bendeela are one of the special locals of this popular campsite.
- Wombats don't have great eyesight, but make up for it with their strong sense of smell and hearing, and sensitivity to ground vibrations.

## Respect my home

- Wombats are mysterious and intelligent creatures, mostly nocturnal and active at dawn through to dusk.
- Wombats may use up to 12 burrows within their territory.
- If you come across a wombat burrow please keep a wide distance.

### I am a wild animal

- Never approach or touch a wombat.
- Although cute and furry in appearance, wombats are in no way tame or suitable to be pets.
- If disturbed wombats can be unpredictable and aggressive.



# **Visitor Code Of Conduct**

- Bendeela Recreation Area is patrolled by NSW Police and WaterNSW Authorised Officers.
- The harming of wildlife is an offence under NSW legislation.
- Persons will be prosecuted if they are found to be causing any harm or damage to wildlife.
- If you witness another person causing harm or distress to wildlife at Bendeela Recreation Area please tell security and contact WaterNSW on 1800 061 069 immediately.
- It is important that visitors and WaterNSW work together to minimise harm to our wildlife.
- Appropriate behaviour will ensure the safety and enjoyment of all visitors.



### The secret life of wombats

- Wombats are very secretive and spend about three quarters of their time in burrows.
- Although they appear to be slow they can move quite fast and with great agility if needed.
- Baby wombats are called 'joeys' and they stay with their mums for well over a year.
- Wombat mums are very protective and may charge or bite you if approached.

### Keeping wombats and people healthy

- Sarcoptic mange is a condition commonly spread in animals. Sadly some of the wombats in Bendeela are now getting sick and dying from this condition.
- Mange will make the wombat scratch so much that they lose fur and develop sores to the skin, eyes and ears.
- If you do see a sick wombat, do not touch it or go near it, this condition is contagious to humans.
- WaterNSW is working with other agencies to investigate the best approach to wombats suffering from mange.

### Don't feed me

- Wombats can get sick if you try to feed them.
- Wombats are herbivorous (vegetarian). They graze on a wide variety of grasses and drink regularly.
- Healthy wombats should eat a natural diet, and not food scraps from visitors or campers.


Avoid driving at night time, dawn and dusk.
